

## Three Events in December Offer Fun Chances to Celebrate the Season in Milwaukie

December is a festive month in Milwaukie! The community is invited to gather on **Saturday, Dec. 7 from 4 to 6 p.m.** for the annual tradition of decorating umbrellas and parading down Main Street to the historic city hall building (10722 SE Main St.) to celebrate the lighting of the tree. There are prizes for the best decorated umbrellas, with the Milwaukie Arts Committee judging the entries. The parade begins at about 4:30 p.m. beginning at the south downtown plaza (near the post office). Community groups supporting the parade include American Legion Post 180, Milwaukie CERT, Rex Putnam High School Kingsmen Thunder Drumline, Milwaukie High School Band, and Millie T. Goose. The parade concludes with treats and hot drinks sponsored by the Rotary Club of Milwaukie, and the tree lighting ceremony at 5:15 p.m. New this year: Bike Milwaukie will organize a ride leading to the Umbrella Parade, and a bicycle decorating category is included in the decorating contest!

On **Saturday, Dec. 21 from 4:30 to 7:30 p.m.,** head down to Milwaukie Bay Park to warm by the fires, watch the combined fleet of Christmas Ships and purchase some refreshments benefitting the Lewelling Neighborhood District Association's community building activities. The Beer Store Milwaukie will host a beer garden featuring craft beverages. Several large tents are also provided to help with winter weather. The Christmas Ships pass by Milwaukie Bay Park twice, once at about 5:30 p.m. and again at about 7:30 p.m. A shuttle service is available this year from the parking lot across from the historic city hall building for anyone with mobility concerns.

Closing out 2024 is Bing in the New Year on **Dec. 31 from 6 to 9 p.m.** in the parking lot across from the historic city hall building. Organized by the Milwaukie Arts Committee, this family-friendly event features live music, a traditional Chinese lion dance, festive food and drinks from pFriem and Keeper Coffee, along with other food vendors, and a Times Square-style giant cherry drop at 9 p.m.

## The Impact of Local Government

The national election dominated the headlines for months. As important as that was, what influences you more is local government because of its direct impact on your daily life. The city provides water services, supplies us with library books, repairs our streets, and polices our neighborhoods to name just a few of those direct impacts.

You have more opportunity to influence city government with easy access to city leadership. There are a variety of ways you can interact

with and influence your city government:

- **1.Voting is fundamental to democracy.** We just had a big election but let me encourage everyone to vote the entire ballot in the future. With so much media attention on national elections our city elections can be overlooked. In our race for two City Council positions more than 3,000 eligible city voters made no choice in the City Council race while voting in other races on the same ballot. Hopefully, I have highlighted the importance of local government so you will consider the whole ballot in the future.
- 2.Attend a public meeting, like a City Council session, which meets on the first three Tuesdays of each month. You can simply observe or provide testimony. If you can't make it in person you can participate via Zoom, observe in real time, or watch a replay afterward. How do you even know if there will be an item of interest at the meeting? The agenda is posted on the city website a week before the meeting. In addition to City Council meetings, all board and committee meetings are open to the public. Check out the Planning Commission or Budget Committee to name a few. You might even decide to apply to serve on one of our 11 boards and committees, or get involved with your Neighborhood District Association (NDA). - **3.Express your view on a particular topic.** Engage Milwaukie (**engage.milwaukieoregon.gov**) is the city's online engagement platform to gather opinion about specific topics, like transportation, parks, etc. The topics are posted long enough to gather significant community input, and the results are then used for analysis and follow up action.

Helpful Hint: The city also publishes several email newsletters that can alert you about public meetings and provide updates about citywide and NDA activities. You can subscribe to what interests you at www.milwaukieoregon.gov/subscribe. These reminders can keep you in the loop.

Your involvement promotes responsive and accountable government because city leadership needs a variety of viewpoints to develop policies that support community well-being. Robust resident participation also fosters a sense of cooperation between the government and public to achieve shared positive outcomes.

## **Protecting Deliveries**



As the holiday season approaches and online shopping increases, the Milwaukie Police Department reminds everyone to be vigilant and take steps to protect those deliveries from porch pirates. Thieves target packages left on doorsteps and porches, especially when homeowners aren't around. Here are a few tips to help prevent package theft:

**Track Deliveries:** Stay informed about the delivery status with tracking notifications. If possible, schedule deliveries for when someone is home, or have packages delivered to a secure location, such as a neighbor's house or a package locker.

Use a Smart Doorbell or Security Cameras: Install a doorbell camera or security cameras that monitor the front porch. Many cameras send alerts for motion or suspicious activity, and footage may help authorities, if theft occurs.

Choose In-Store Pick-Up or Delivery Locker Services: Many retailers and delivery services offer in-store pick-up options or secure lockers where packages may be retrieved at convenient times of the day.

Ask Neighbors for Help: Ask a trusted neighbor to collect packages, if no one will be home. Similarly, keep an eye out for deliveries at neighbors' homes.

**Report Suspicious Activity:** If you notice someone acting suspiciously near your or others' homes, don't hesitate to report it to the police immediately. Early intervention is key to preventing theft.

## Community: An Important Piece of Every Emergency Kit

There are many considerations about what to keep in an emergency kit, including medication, copies of important documents, and written contact phone numbers for family or friends in different parts of the country. The single most important resource in an emergency is community. Whether you have dinner with your neighbors regularly or have never spoken before, right now is the best time to meet with them to talk about preparedness. Federal aid may take up to two weeks to arrive following a major disaster. Sharing resources and skills with neighbors is one of the best ways to keep yourself and your household safe while waiting for help to arrive. No single home is as resilient as all of the homes on a block sharing resources.

One great way to become more involved in community preparedness is to join the Milwaukie Community Emergency Response Team (CERT). CERT members receive special training in first aid, search and rescue and communication. The are among the first members of the community to respond to a major disaster. CERT recruits throughout the year, with trainings held annually. To learn more, visit **milwaukiepsf.org/cert-2**.

## Tree Preparedness for Inclement Weather



With winter weather approaching, now is a great time to have trees inspected by a certified arborist. High winds, heavy rain, snow and ice can damage stressed trees, causing branches to snap or trees to uproot. The key to minimizing a tree's risk of damaging property is to prepare ahead of time. While there is no such thing as a 100% storm-resistant tree, proper care and

regular maintenance, overseen by a certified arborist, will help mitigate risks trees may pose to nearby infrastructure.

Regular tree pruning is essential. Dead and/or weak branches can be torn from trees during a storm. Regular pruning by a certified arborist over the course of a tree's life can create a good foundation of healthy branches and, in turn, a more storm-resistant tree.

If a storm-damaged tree on your property requires immediate removal, it may be done to eliminate an immediate hazard, however, a retroactive tree removal permit application must be submitted within 7 days after the work is completed. These permits should be submitted online at **milwaukie.govbuilt.com/tree-permits**.

## Winter Weather Response Plans



The city has a comprehensive winter weather response plan to help ensure the safety of community members during winter weather events. Here are some key points from the plan:

#### **CITY PREPARATION**

- *Public Works:* Crews from the Public Works and Police Departments work around the clock to keep roads safe and passable for emergency response. The city has recently purchased new equipment, including a new sand and plow truck, additional plows and sanders.
- **De-Icing:** Liquid de-icer (magnesium chloride) is applied to key streets to prevent ice and snow from bonding to the roadway.
- *Warming Centers:* Several warming centers are available in Clackamas and Multnomah counties for those in need of a warm place during winter weather.

#### INDIVIDUAL PREPARATION

- *Supplies:* Ensure necessary supplies are onhand, such as food, water and medications.
- *Travel:* The city advises community members to avoid traveling during icy or snowy conditions, but use caution, if travel is necessary

#### SAFETY TIPS

- **Driving:** Use traction devices, if necessary, and travel at speeds appropriate for the road and weather conditions.
- *Street Maintenance:* Not all streets within city limits are maintained by the City of Milwaukie. Check the city's map for details about which streets are included in the city's response plan.

## The Little Blue Store is Open During Construction

Construction began in April for the Washington Street Area Improvements Project. The Little Blue Store at 2936 SE Washington St. is situated at the very center of the construction area for this capital improvements project. As such, this beloved neighborhood market has been impacted

by construction activity for the last few months. The business has remained open during this time, but the Little Blue Store has seen a sharp decline in customers. While the city is doing everything it can to minimize these impacts, ultimately, The Little Blue Store depends on the support of community members.

Earlier in the year Hagos Tekle and his family made the bold decision to elevate the store to a proper food market, eliminating the sale of tobacco products with ambitions to sell fresh produce, ready-made and homemade Ethiopian meals, and otherwise provide a new experience for the community. This change, from a convenience store to an authentic Ethiopian market is slated to happen in March 2025. These ambitions can only be realized, if everyone supports The Little Blue Store during these construction months. Come grab a snack and talk to Hagos about his plans!

Norma began her spiritual practice at the same time as her political life unfolded. She is an 86<sup>th</sup> generation Zen Master, having trained at Chozen-ji for more than 40 years.
