# City Council Sets New Goals This Month



The new year is a time for setting intentions for the months to come, and City Council is seizing that energy by adopting new goals. City Council regularly sets goals to articulate policy priorities and help direct city resources. Generally, goals are set for two years. The current City Council wants to better align the timeline of their goals with the city's biennial budget calendar, so they are currently considering what goals to select for 2025-2027. New goals would then be set in 2028.

The goal setting process kicked off in November 2024 with City Council generating a starting list of several potential goal "ideas." Council members then solicited feedback from the community about these ideas through an open house last month, as well as an online survey—the results of which can be viewed at [engage.milwaukieoregon.gov/city-council-goals-2](https://engage.milwaukieoregon.gov/city-council-goals-2).

The survey feedback, along with other public comments and community data, informed a 2-day retreat held by City Council on Jan. 31 and Feb. 1 where they determined which goals to adopt. ## When to Call 9-1-1

Here are some tips from the Milwaukie Police Department (MPD) about when to call 911 or the non-emergency line (503-786-7500).



**When to Call 911:** If you or someone else is in immediate danger, or experiencing a life-threatening situation. This includes incidents, such as severe medical emergencies (heart attacks, strokes, severe bleeding), fires, car accidents and crimes in progress. Also, dial 911, if someone is at risk of harm, such as during domestic violence situations or if a weapon is involved.

**Reasons to Text 911:** Where available, it can be a valuable option when speaking aloud is unsafe, such as during a home invasion or in a situation where calling could alert an intruder. Texting can also be useful for individuals with speech or hearing impairments, however, ensure messages are clear and concise.

**When to Call Non-Emergency:** For situations that require police assistance, but are not life-threatening or urgent, it's best to call a non-emergency number. These situations may include reporting property damage, lost or stolen items, such as bicycles, or noise complaints. Using a non-emergency line helps keep 911 lines open for actual emergencies, preventing delays in critical response. For the MPD, no call is too small.

In Milwaukie, callers may initially reach LOCOM, CCOM or Portland's BOEC dispatches, if using a cell phone. This is normal, and giving an exact location to the call-taker will route the call quickly to the appropriate dispatch.

## Joseph Briglio Named Assistant City Manager



Joseph Briglio was selected to serve as Milwaukie's assistant city manager. He was chosen following a series of panel interviews that included both city staff and local residents as panel members. Briglio was hired as the city's community development director in 2021. He then began serving as the acting assistant city manager in September 2024 after Emma Sagor was named the city manager.

"Joseph's track record of success delivering pivotal projects and driving change as community development director really made him stand out from the other candidates," Sagor said. "In addition to the strong relationships he has built across the city, Joseph is a highly respected manager and has great experience leading organizational improvement, which will make him an excellent fit for the assistant city manager role."

As assistant city manager, Briglio will shepherd several key initiatives, including an update to the city's capital improvement development process, an assessment of the city's organizational structure and the implementation of City Council's goals for 2025-2027, among many others. He will continue to serve as acting community development director for the city for at least six months while the city assesses organizational needs.

Briglio has worked in local government for more than 20 years, winning awards for his creative approach to civic engagement and public service. Prior to the City of Milwaukie, he served as the community development director for the City of Happy Valley and the regional affairs officer for the Southern California Association of Governments. Briglio has also taught graduate programs in public administration, and managed affordable housing programs, environmental sustainability initiatives, and a high-tech business incubator.

## Good Neighbor Grant Program

The city will soon begin the Good Neighbor grant program, which aims to support projects that offer significant community and environmental benefits. Program parameters include:

### Eligible projects must aim to:

- Improve recreational opportunities (e.g., pathways, parks, trails).
- Enhance fish and wildlife habitat and riparian areas.
- Foster collaboration between the city and Water Environmental Services for approved purposes.
- Enhance public knowledge about wastewater treatment and surface water management through education and special projects.

### Application Process:

- Applications are reviewed and recommended for approval by the Citizens Utility Advisory Committee.
- Projects must be in an approved project area.
- The initial application cycle will run from March to June 2025.
- Both internal and external projects are accepted.

### Eligible Applicants:

- Non-profit organizations
- Neighborhood District Associations
- The city

### Funding Availability:

- Internal Projects: Dependent on available funding
- External Projects: Up to \$50,000

**Selection Criteria:** Projects are scored based on several criteria, with a total of 35 points available. Key factors include improvements to recreational opportunities, habitat enhancement, public education, equity considerations, climate resilience, and habitat connectivity.

## Milwaukie Becomes A Bee City USA



City Council voted in September 2024 to become a Bee City USA, joining many other cities and campuses across the country that are united in improving their landscapes for pollinators. This designation is the culmination of months of effort by the Rotary Club of Milwaukie, Historic Milwaukie Neighborhood District Association, Park & Recreation Board and city staff.

Bee City USA is an initiative of the Xerces Society for Invertebrate Conservation. The goal is to galvanize communities to sustain pollinators by providing them with healthy habitat, rich in a variety of native plants and free of insecticides. Pollinators, such as bees, butterflies, moths, beetles, flies, hummingbirds, and many others are responsible for the reproduction of almost 90% of the world's flowering plant species, and one in every three bites of food humans consume.

To maintain the Bee City USA status, the city will host public awareness activities, provide signage and web links, prepare an annual report about habitat enhancement activities, and maintain a committee (Parks & Recreation Board) to work with the community about pollinator conservation. ## Prevent Home Heating Fires

Heating methods, such as wood burning stoves, space heaters and fireplaces may be the right choice for households, but they can also be a contributing factor in residential fires. These safety tips can help create a fire-safe home during the cold months.



### Wood Stoves and Fireplaces

- Be sure the fireplace or stove is installed properly. Wood stoves should have at least three feet of adequate clearance from combustible surfaces, along with proper floor support and protection.
- Keep a glass or metal screen in front of the fireplace opening to prevent embers or sparks from jumping out, unwanted material from going in, and help prevent the possibility of burns to occupants.
- Do not use flammable liquids to start or accelerate a fire.
- Before going to sleep, be sure the fireplace fire is out. Never close the damper with hot ashes in the fireplace. A closed damper will help the fire to heat up again, forcing toxic carbon monoxide into the home.
- Have the chimney inspected annually and cleaned, if necessary, especially if it has not been used for a while.

### Furnace Heating

- Have the furnace inspected to ensure it is in good working condition.
- Leave furnace repairs to qualified specialists. Do not attempt repairs yourself, unless qualified.
- Keep trash and other combustibles away from the heating system.

Remember, it is important to always have working smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors in the home.
