

It's Budget Season!



As summer rolls in, the City of Milwaukie is also poised to roll into the next budget cycle. Milwaukie adopts a biennial budget, which means the budget city council is poised to adopt this month will run from July 1,2024 through June 30, 2026.

A city's budget is more than just a table of dollars and cents. It's a critical policy document that spells out priorities, strategic trade-offs and planned investments for the two years ahead and beyond.

Last month, the city's Budget Committee—comprised of city council and community members—voted unanimously to approve the budget for adoption. City council will vote to adopt the budget during their June 4 regular session meeting. The complete budget document can be viewed at www.milwaukieoregon.gov/finance/budgets.

The 2025-2026 biennial budget comes on the heels of several years of unprecedented change that have reshaped Milwaukie's financial landscape and the services the community expects. The city is confident that the proposed budget will ensure Milwaukie remains in a healthy financial position throughout the next two years, while allowing us to institutionalize the progress made on current council goals and prepare for the challenges of tomorrow.

Porchfest Returns to Milwaukie on July 12, 19 & 26



The Milwaukie Arts Committee is gearing up for the fifth annual Milwaukie Porchfest concert series, happening the last three Fridays in July. Porchfest concerts and performances are held across Milwaukie—

outside of homes, businesses and public spaces from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m. on July 12, 19 and 26. Investment Takes Off in Milwaukie's Urban Renewal Area



City council, acting as the Milwaukie Redevelopment Commission (MRC) Board of Directors, will also vote to adopt the MRC budget for the next two years on June 4. The MRC oversees investments in Milwaukie's urban renewal area, which was established in 2016. Within the urban reneweal area (see map), projects that enhance development, livability and economic development are funded through a mechanism called tax increment financing.

By late 2020, sufficient tax increment had accrued to justify the creation of a 5-year investment strategy. This biennial budget will see more than \$6.5 million of investments in the URA as we implement the investment strategy known as the five-year action plan (adopted in June 2022). The action plan identifies infrastructure projects, downtown improvements, and the launch of exciting economic development programs for

businesses, including storefront and tenant improvement grants.

Bulky Waste Collection on June 8 and 15



This year's curbside bulky waste collection event is **Saturday, June 8 or June 15**, depending on location. The event is meant to help residents dispose of items that don't fit into typical garbage carts and can't be sold or

donated. Bulky waste day collections are limited to single-family residents within Milwaukie city limits with current solid waste services. To determine your property's pick-up date and hauler, visit the mapping tool at www.milwaukieoregon.gov/bulkywaste.

THINGS TO REMEMBER:

- City staff do not coordinate bulky waste day collections and cannot reschedule missed or partial pick-ups—residents must contact their hauler directly to notify them of issues.
- Contact your hauler for a current list of accepted items. A list of standard items is available on the city's website. This list is not exhaustive and haulers should be contacted directly for specific item acceptability.
- Items listed as unacceptable will not be collected.
- Items not prepared correctly will not be collected.
- Do not use weekly carts/bins—these are strictly for regularly scheduled collection days.
- Place all items curbside by 4 a.m. on collection day. Do not add items after 4 a.m.

Bulky waste collection is a lengthy process and takes a significant effort from haulers – please be patient as they work the day of the event. Depending on the volume of items, collection may take all day or into the evening. Haulers may also use multiple trucks to collect specific items.

Please keep in mind: Items collected during bulky waste days go to landfills, so be sure to recycle or donate items whenever possible.

City staff cannot answer questions related to missed pickups or accepted items, or schedule new pickups. It is important to contact your hauler directly for these issues:

Fireworks Prohibited in Milwaukie City Limits

As a reminder, community members are encouraged to take note of a code change regarding fireworks. Last year, City Council passed ordinance 2225, which prohibits the sale, possession and use of fireworks in Milwaukie city limits. The maximum possible fine for a fireworks violation is \$1,000. In the past, temporary bans have been placed on the use of fireworks when the risk of wildfires was high. After weighing their potential impacts to veterans, pets and wildlife, as well as the continuing fire hazards they pose to homes and other structures, especially during the drier summer months, City Council decided to make the ban permanent. Community members may notice fireworks stands are missing this summer as well. The new ordinance extends to them, as well as permanent stores and businesses, within city limits.

For those looking to celebrate Independence Day with fireworks, the city encourages community members to seek out public fireworks displays outside of the Milwaukie area. For more information about the new fireworks ordinance, visit www.milwaukieoregon.gov.

Emergency Kits: Food and Energy

Food and energy are among the two most important preparation needs. Many households already have shelfstable food that can be used in an emergency. Canned foods can generally be stored safely for years without electricity. Crackers, protein bars and nut butters are also good options. It's worth including comfort foods in an emergency kit. After a major disaster, familiar treats can be a source of comfort. Military rations (i.e. MREs) and freeze-dried survival food can be good options as well, but are generally more expensive than shelf-stable goods. An average adult will need to consume 2,000-3,000 calories per day, a range which should be considered when planning for two weeks of self-reliance. Energy, for heating, cooking and light can be provided in a variety of ways. Barbecues, camp stoves and fire pits are good cooking options where available, but should not be used in enclosed spaces. Gas or diesel generators can provide an emergency source of electricity, but must also be kept in wellventilated spaces to avoid dangerous exhaust fumes. Flashlights and lanterns are reliable light sources. Make sure to include extra batteries, stored in a waterproof container, if possible.

As with all emergency preparation, individual circumstances will determine what the best option is for each household. When planning for a disaster, make choices that make sense for your unique situation. For more information, visit www.milwaukieoregon.gov/emergencyprep.

Importance of Erosion Control Permits



The Clean Water Act, established in 1972, emerged as a response to escalating concerns about water pollution across the United States. It is a comprehensive framework for regulating the discharge of pollutants and aims to maintain the integrity of the country's water. Since construction activities have the potential to accelerate soil erosion 40,000 times above preconstruction rates, erosion control is one of the Clean Water Act's most critical components for Milwaukie's aquatic ecosystems.

In Milwaukie, an erosion control permit is required for businesses and individuals engaging in activities that disturb 500 square feet of soil. In most cases, erosion control permits require detailed erosion control plans that outline specific measures to take during these activities, including perimeter fencing, concrete wash stations and vegetation buffers to minimize soil displacement and sedimentation. Once the plan is approved, an initial inspection for erosion control measures allows projects to begin. Routine inspections and a final inspection are parts of the process to ensure erosion control measures are effectively implemented and maintained throughout the duration of the project. Failure to obtain or adhere to erosion control permit requirements can result in penalties, fines and project shutdowns. Milwaukie's waterways—Johnson Creek, Kellogg Creek and Willamette River—support both people and wildlife in numerous ways. Since the Clean Water Act, waterways around the country have experienced huge improvements to water quality—the very same water used for drinking and recreation. With erosion control measures in place, the soil can be kept where it belongs and maintain the community's natural beauty.

As warm weather approaches, Clackamas Fire District reminds everyone about the importance of practicing safe water habits. Follow these important tips from the American Red Cross to keep safe:

- Swim in designated areas supervised by lifeguards
- Never leave children unattended near water. Don't trust a child's life to another child, and teach children to ask permission to go near the water
- Be cautious around ocean shorelines, rivers, and lakes. Remember that cold temperatures, currents, and underwater hazards are dangerous.
- Be aware of underwater obstructions in low water levels
- · When boating, wear a life jacket
- Avoid alcohol use, which impairs judgment, balance and coordination, as well as the body's ability to stay warm
- Install and use barriers around home pools and hot tubs
- Enroll in home pool safety, water safety and CPR/ AED courses to learn how to prevent and respond to emergencies
