

Clackamas Water Environment Services (WES) is hosting a 50th anniversary celebration for the Kellogg Creek Water Resource Recovery Facility (11525 SE McLoughlin Blvd.) on Wednesday, May 8 from 12:30 to 1:30 p.m. Community members are invited to join the celebration and enjoy a light lunch, dessert and a chance to learn about the significance of clean water.

Launched in 1974, the Kellogg Creek Water Resource Recovery Facility serves WES customers in Happy Valley, Milwaukie and unincorporated areas of Clackamas County. Every day, the facility cleans nearly 7 million gallons of wastewater before releasing it into the Willamette River. In recognition of its excellence in plant operations and permit compliance, the facility received the Peak Performance Silver Standard Award from the National Association of Clean Water Agencies in 2020. In the early 1930s, people would have stopped in at Carlson's Lunch Room for a midday bite. Decades later, community members opted to go to Whiz

Burger for "The Frenchie" or stopped into Mac's Pit for some barbeque. Some restaurants, such as Mike's Drive-In, have lured people towards other parts of Milwaukie, but Main Street has provided a variety of meal options. Even as some businesses shuttered, many were replaced with new restaurants. The restaurant where Libbie's currently resides dates to the 1940s when it was first opened as Speed's, then became Pal's Shanty, and then Libbie's. Perry's Pharmacy has been open for almost as long, and they continue to serve the same freshly-made sandwiches as they have in years past.

MPD Offers Free Bicycle Registration



Did you know every 30 seconds a bicycle is stolen in North America? No, that's not a typo. While Milwaukie's theft rate for bicycles is very low compared to the rest of the region, it still makes sense to

take additional preventive measures to deter theft and provide the best chance for bicycles to be returned, if stolen or missing. The Milwaukie Police Department has partnered with Project 529 for bicycle registration resources for the community. The registration process is simple and best completed from a smartphone application from Project 529. Registration benefits include: centralized information storage of bicycle details, easy reporting of bicycle theft, and nationwide access for law enforcement and the community to stolen bicycle reports. Once a bicycle is registered, only participating law enforcement agencies can view a bicycle's registration details. If the bicycle becomes missing or stolen and the user activates a stolen bike report on the app, the basic information and photos are visible for the community to view creating a large audience on the street looking for the bike! Sediment Sampling in Kellogg Creek



This summer, sediment sample collection will begin in the impoundment area behind Kellogg Dam using large, onwater equipment. Sediment has been accumulating behind the dam since it was built in the mid-1800s, and large

equipment is required to collect samples in places where the accumulation is deep. These samples will provide data about the physical and chemical composition of sediment throughout the impoundment, which will directly inform planning and engineering aspects of restoring lower Kellogg Creek as part of the Kellogg Creek restoration project.

The sampling equipment will be launched from Kronberg Park and McLoughlin Boulevard bridge near Milwaukie Bay Park. Expect to see field testing crews, boats, sampling equipment and cranes at both sites. The Oregon Department of Transportation is working to minimize any traffic impact during the day and two nights (between 10 p.m. and 5 a.m.) of two-lane closures on the OR 99E bridge are anticipated. During sampling, those who live or work near the area may hear periodic noise between 7 a.m. to 7 p.m., Monday through Friday. Kellogg Creek Bioblitz

On May 18 from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m., join the North Clackamas Watershed Council for the Kellogg Creek Bioblitz. At this event, volunteers will help document the plants, birds, insects and other wildlife that are currently in and around the soon-to-be-restored Kellogg Creek. The Kellogg Creek Bioblitz is an important part of ongoing efforts to monitor conditions in the natural areas surrounding the Kellogg Creek impoundment before the Kellogg Creek restoration project begins construction in 2026-27. This event is an opportunity to get outside and enjoy beautiful natural areas near downtown Milwaukie. Even though the habitat in the Kellogg Creek impoundment is fairly degraded, it's still being used by many birds and other wildlife, as well as plenty of plant life. The Kellogg Creek Bioblitz is open to everyone, and local experts will lead each group to help with identification and data submission. The second letter was sent to the Clackamas County Board of Commissioners. The fate of the Wichita Center and its services are up in the air as the County Commissioners, acting as the board for the North Clackamas Parks & Recreation District, chose to end the North Clackamas School District's lease on the property behind closed doors in December 2023. Due to public pressure, the county and school district are now at the negotiating table regarding the sale of the property to the North Clackamas School District. The hope is for this great concentration of resources to remain at this location. The letter encouraged full transparency for the negotiating process and a good deal for the school district.

Smoke Alarm Safety

Smoke alarms save lives. When properly installed and maintained, smoke alarms play a vital role in reducing fire deaths and injuries. If there is a fire in the home, smoke will spread quickly, but smoke alarms provide time to get out.

Important to know:

- A closed door may slow the spread of smoke, heat and fire. Install smoke alarms in every bedroom and outside each separate sleeping area. Install smoke alarms on every level of the home.
- Smoke alarms should be interconnected. When one sounds, they all sound.
- When smoke alarms sound, get outside and stay outside.
- Test smoke alarms once a month to ensure they are functioning properly.
- Replace all smoke alarms in the home every 10 years.
