## **Welcome / Review Minutes**

PARB agreed to record future meetings for the purpose of taking minutes.

## **Public Comment (General)**

No comments received.

## **Discussion: NCPRD Monthly Division Report**

NCPRD has experienced changes in their planning staff. Heather Koch will no longer work for NCPRD.

## **General City Update**

City staff shared information about the most recent city council meeting. Council discussed park governance and decided to provide quarterly updates to the community in addition to executive sessions. The City appealed the judge's decision that council should not be allowed to vote to leave the county park department. They are waiting for a response to the appeal.

City council has reached out to the county to begin negotiations on park governance in Milwaukie. Two Milwaukie city council members and two Clackamas County commissioners will meet with staff to discuss Milwaukie's membership in NCPRD.

City staff announced the hiring of new Assistant City Manager, Emma Sagor, and Equity Program Manager, Gabriela Santoyo-Gutierrez.

Ali represented PARB the public hearings for Bowman-Brae and Balfour parks. The land use applications for both parks passed unanimously.

Staff are aware of parking concerns around Bowman-Brae and Balfour and are working on a solution.

The park project is currently at 75% design. More information during the park update.

Staff announced the city move and the new city hall opening.

#### **Discussion: PARB Calendar**

PARB decided that the in-person meetings on September 27 and October 25 at 5pm will be at the Ledding Library small conference room. City staff will reserve the room.

#### **Discussion: Land Acknowledgement**

City staff shared the land acknowledgement created between the City of Milwaukie and the Grand Ronde. PARB expressed support for reading the land acknowledgement as written, as well as further developing relationships with the Grand Ronde.

V.P. motions to read the land acknowledgement as written at the beginning of PARB meetings. H.B. seconds. The motion passed unanimously and A.F. read the land acknowledgment.

City staff invited PARB to watch a video created for Milwaukie Bay Park's First Fish Heron's Project. The video includes the history of the Grand Ronde Tribe. Future relationships may be developed through Gabriella, the City Equity Program Manager.

#### **Discussion: PARB Goals**

PARB reviewed goals.

PARB discussed creating metrics to tangibly measure movement towards goals.

PARB discussed making adjustments to the demographic questions asked in outreach materials.

#### **Park Development Update**

Staff shared that the City now has possession of the land on Where Else Lane and has opened the passage with temporary signage.

The parks will be behind construction fences starting in January in 2024.

The last opportunity for engagement is on October 8. City staff will be surveying attendees on whether the park designs meet their needs to guide future projects.

Staff shared updated playground designs for Balfour, Bowman-Brae and Scott Parks. PARB discussed playground colors.

#### **Items from PARB members:**

The Parks Foundation is interested in joining Bee City USA. PARB is interested in further discussion.

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### Asset Development

- **Staffing:** Successful recruitment of new Principal Planner to start in late September. The new planner fills the position vacated by Katie Dunham who moved out of state. NCPRD is grateful for Katie's great work and time with NCPRD.

- **Metro Local Share:** Seek Board approval for the finalized intergovernmental agreement between Metro and NCPRD to distribute funds for the park and playground at the Concord site.
- **Park at Jennings Lodge Campus:** Finalize engagement plan, and plan for September 28 from 5:30 to 7 p.m. community event at the property.
- **System Plan:** Finalize contract with Design Workshop, recruit intern, and kick off project.
- **Trolley Trail:** Finalize Safety Audit Report.
- **Staffing:** Recruit to fill Planning and Development Director vacancy.

- **Concord Property:** Finalize construction documents for play area and community center; seek Board approval for Guaranteed Maximum Price amendment for play area and building.
- **System Plan:** Begin system inventory and analysis, develop engagement plan.

- Our new part-time Accounting Specialist 1 started August 28. She will be taking on all of our Accounts Payable functions.

### **CURRENT PROJECTS/TASKS**

- We are recruiting for 2 new NCPRD Budget Committee members.
- The FY 2022-23 audit is near and staff is working to finalize NCPRD finances by completing work papers. The work papers ensure the information we are gathering for the auditors is accurate and complete.

- FY 2024-25 budget prep will start in November 2023.

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## **Older Adult Services**

The purpose of the Older Adult Services program is to provide coordinated nutritional, transportation, educational and social service programming to the communities’ older adults and persons with disabilities; assisting them in remaining independent and helping them thrive in their later years.

#### **SIGNIFICANT ACCOMPLISHMENTS**

- The summer is when most of the cutting, splitting and stacking is done for the Emergency Firewood Program. This Program provides low-income seniors with wood to help supplement their heating costs or to have wood on hand in case of a power outage. The logs in the picture were more than our regular volunteers could cut. Fortunately, Apex Tree Service volunteered to help us process these large logs.



- Milwaukie Community Center (MCC) Foundation Development Director, Junia Stephens, has resigned to accept a position with the Development office at Columbia Memorial Hospital in Astoria. The North Coast is Junia's primary residence and this will make her commute much more manageable. She has been leading the work of the Foundation since March of 2018 and has brought in many sponsors and dollars in support of the MCC's programs. She will be greatly missed. The Foundation is in the process of finding her replacement.



#### **PROJECTS/TASKS BEING WORKED ON**

- During September's maintenance week, the main entrance/lobby at the MCC is getting a makeover. A new modern look will brighten the area and update the feel of this public space.
- The Energy Assistance Program begins on October 2. This federally funded program is designed to assist low-income seniors and persons with disabilities with their energy bills. MCC Social

Service staff will make appointments with people to help them fill out the forms and prepare the required documentation.

- **October 21:** The MCC Foundation is holding a Mah Jongg tournament on Saturday, October 21. This fundraiser for the foundation provides those who play an opportunity to have fun and win prizes. There is a \$38 entrance fee that includes lunch.

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## **Parks, Trails and Natural Areas**

The purpose of the Parks, Trails and Natural Areas program is to provide management, maintenance and ongoing stewardship services to NCPRD residents and visitors so they can access safe, clean and well maintained parks, trails and natural areas both now and into the future.

### **SIGNIFICANT ACCOMPLISHMENTS**

- Benches painted in most parks.
- Hazard tree removal permits were submitted for Scott Park and the Trolley Trail.

### **PROJECTS/TASKS BEING WORKED ON**

- Districtwide backflow testing.
- Assisting with Concord project.
- Alma Myra Playground replacement project has been delayed due to a design issue regarding slide bracing. A new bracket has been manufactured and is on its way to be installed. The opening has been delayed. The new projected opening date is 8/31/2023.
- Pruning is ongoing.
- Altamont concrete walking path connection scheduled for September.
- Gym floor refurbishing at Concord and Clackamas properties.
- CRR project contracting.
- Staff attended a 4-County Cooperative Weed Management Area field day to learn about aquatic and noxious weed eradication methods and practices at Camp Bonneville.
- Natural Areas has begun Japanese Knotweed, *Fallopia japonica*, treatments and mapping.
- Natural Areas helped at the Johnson Creek Watershed Council's Creek Clean-Up Event on August 19 with both Mill Park and the Luther Rd properties.
- Met with WES, North Clackamas Watershed Council, and the Wetland's Conservancy on 8/29 to discuss implementing amphibian egg mass monitoring at 3 Creeks and potentially other NCPRD properties with volunteers
- Events:
  - Hosted Kellogg Creek Clean-up for volunteers through North Clackamas Park on 8/26.
  - Support for Movies in the Park.
  - Bingo setup.

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## Recreation

The purpose of the NCPRD Recreation program is to provide a variety of recreational and educational opportunities directly and in partnership with other providers to enhance personal health and the quality of life for all residents of the District.

### **SIGNIFICANT ACCOMPLISHMENTS**

- Fall registration opened on August 1. There are 542 people enrolled in Recreation programs. New fall classes include: Intro to Spanish, Spanish II Conversation, Intro to Breaking (Dancing), Intro to Tablets and Androids, Intro to iPhones and iPads, and Loom Knitting. Summer registration wrapped up with 692 participants.
- The RecMobile summer season wrapped up on Friday, August 11 after offering free drop-in activities to children ages 6-10 in the surrounding neighborhoods of 10 select parks throughout the District, Monday – Friday for seven weeks. 900 children participated this summer. Our most popular sites were Wichita Park, Ball-Michel Park and Pioneer Park with an average of 18 to 22 children at each site. The RecMobile assisted an additional 280 kids at concerts and Movies in the Park events this summer.



- On Saturday, August 19, Minions the Rise of Gru, the last movie in our Movies in the Park summer series, aired at Wichita Center. Our Movies in the Park event series showed a total of 5 movies this summer attracting 1,920 total attendees – an approximate increase of 51% from last year's total attendance of 1,275. Families enjoyed crafts, games, Kona Ice, popcorn and more. Sunshine Early Learning Childcare Center was the premier sponsor for the series. Additional sponsors included Axiom Pest Control, Pietro's Pizza Milwaukie, WES, Kona Ice and Linda Skeelee of Windermere Realty Trust.



- Completed three summer STEAMventures camps: Blast Off, Mini World in a Bottle and Behind the Scenes concluded in August. Each week-long camp was offered twice with our Blast Off rocket camp being offered three times over the summer. A total of 80 children participated across the seven camp offerings.



- Staff trained and hired seven lifeguards and two cashiers in anticipation of the college staff that will be leaving for the school year. We also trained and promoted two shift coordinators and four head guards - setting the Aquatic Park (AP) up with a robust staff roster for the fall.
- Amongst our facility rentals at the Aquatic Park this month, we hosted NW Disability Support group. This group brought over 350 swimmers for their August event!
- Fall swim lesson registration filled most spots within 10 minutes. In total, nearly 500 residents are signed up for fall swim lessons.
- NCPRD Sports staff organized the 8<sup>th</sup> Annual County Cornhole Championship. Congratulations to NCPRD's Kevin Cayson and Bret Penselin, Lawn Enforcement team, for winning the Commissioners Cup!





- Summer Nights adult softball league concluded play on Sunday, August 13. Five league champions were crowned: Coed Social IBEW, Coed Rec Dirty Unicorns, Monday Men's Rec Hoodlums, Thursday Men's Rec Pirates, and our first women's league champion Scoot McGroot!
- The summer camp season ended on Friday, August 19. Due to the extreme summer heat, four camps with full rosters were canceled. The most popular camps were our Fun Field Days Camps with waitlists of between 77 and 100 per camp, our Multi-sport Camp with a waitlist of 127, Cooking Camps with waitlists of 77 and 122, Outdoor Explorer's with a waitlist of 111, and Track & Field Camps with waitlists of 78 and 96. Summer camp offerings will be expanded for most of these camps for the summer 2024 season.
- Our first Adaptive & Inclusive Soccer league is off to a great start! The season started on Saturday, August 19, and runs through October 14. All 19 participants, ages 8-25, are learning soccer fundamentals while building new friendships. Games start on Saturday, September 8.
- The North Clackamas Park spring/summer baseball and softball season ended on August 30. It was a great season of playing ball and beautiful weather! The final score was NCPRD 136, Mother Nature 15.

#### **PROJECTS/TASKS BEING WORKED ON**

- Staff are wrapping up summer programs and events, and completing cleaning and organizational projects to prepare for next summer.
- Staff continue to plan, develop and coordinate upcoming winter events – Winter Celebrations, Lunar New Year and My Little Valentine Dance, and winter and spring recreation class offerings.
- Staff are working on developing event sponsorship packages for the upcoming annual event lineup.
- Final preparation steps are underway for the Aquatic Park annual facility shutdown. This will include draining the pools, large repair and replacement projects and staff training.
- High School swim season is just around the corner and promises to be another packed season serving the community as booking requests are already rolling in!
- Hoopers Fall Clinic for grades 3-5 and 6-8 is 80% full with a month left before registration closes. The basketball clinics will run for 6-weeks at the Mount Scott Elementary gymnasium.
- Fall Frenzy adult softball league has 28 of 30 spots filled. The fall season begins on September 10 and will conclude on November 10. Games will be played on the turf at Nelson Sports Complex.
- Sideout Volleyball has 265 participants registered to play this season. Most teams were full within the first 2.5 weeks of registration opening. There is a vast waitlist for grades 1-2 and we are currently working to add more teams in the 5-6 and 7-8 divisions. The 2023 registration numbers are on course to surpass the program's participant registration numbers for the past four years.
- Fall Pre-K multi-sport registration closed on Sunday, September 3. Twelve out of the 15 roster spots are filled. Children, ages 3-5 years, learn the fundamentals of popular sports such as basketball and soccer.
- North Clackamas Park Sunday fall baseball begins play on September 10 and concludes on October 29.



- Fiesta Latina en el Parque is approaching and will occur on September 23, 2023, from noon to 4 p.m. at North Clackamas Park. Univision and the Milwaukie Community Center Foundation are sponsoring the event. Performances will be provided by La Consentida Banda Estrella De Oro, Mariachi Mexico En La Piel, an Aztec dance group, Ollin Yolliztli PDX and a Peruvian dance group, MB Peru Baila Asi. The event will feature delicious food by Birrieria Carlos, Mi Xalisco, Sabor Casero, Las Marquezas, Rosas Churros and Dairy Hill Ice Cream. Various artisan vendors will sell jewelry, clothes, shoes and other accessories of Latin heritage. In the Kids Zone, there will be a magic show with free cotton candy, kid's crafts and games that represent an origin in Latin America.
